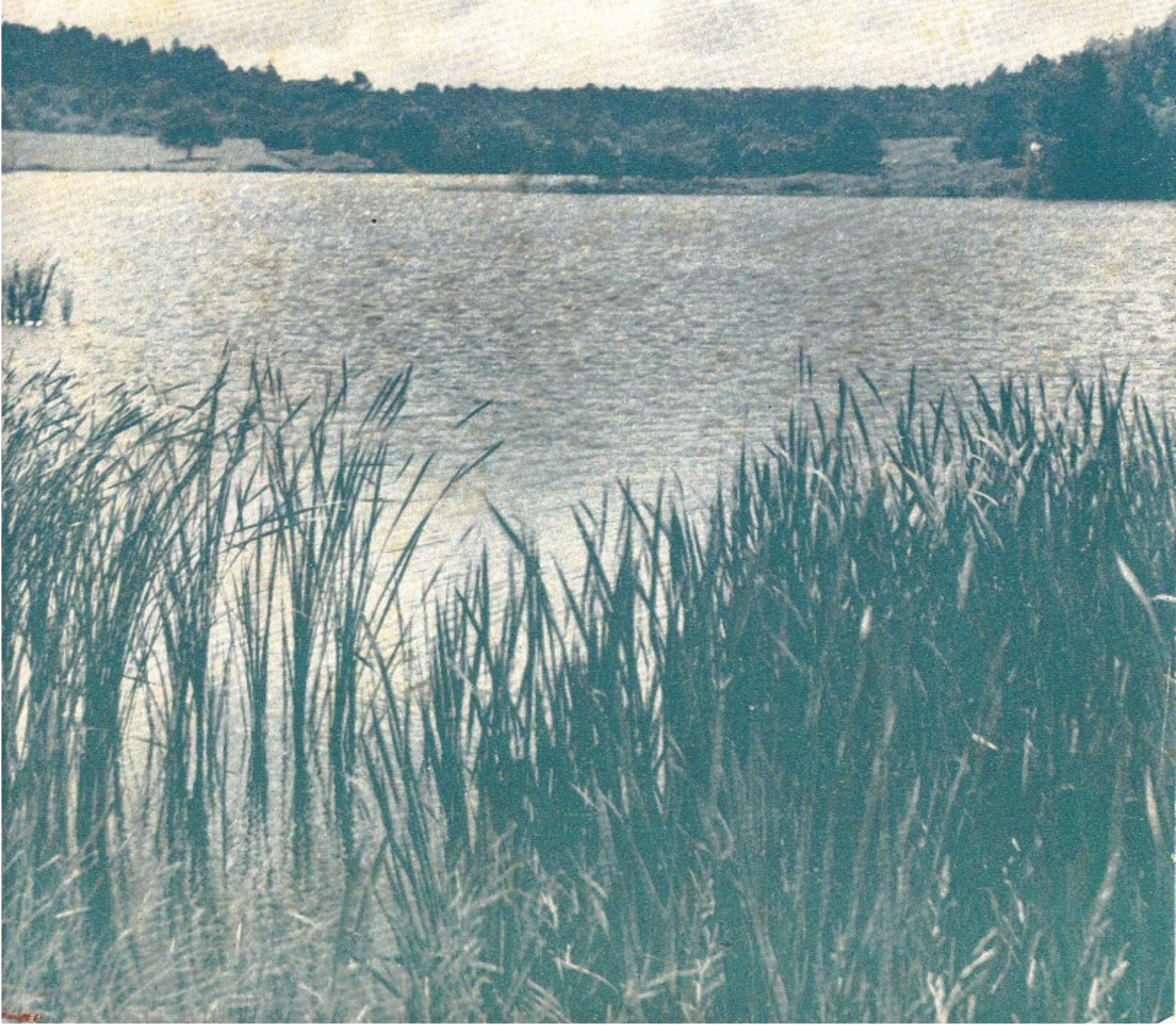

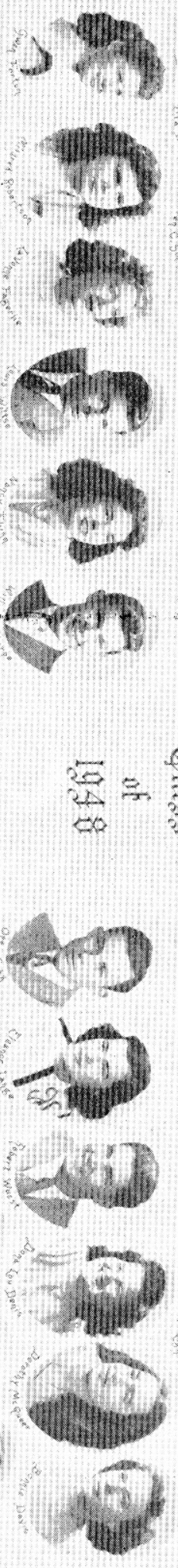

Phillip Frye, Bill King, Ronnie Draheim, and Jim Fox received basketball letters from the seventh grade team.

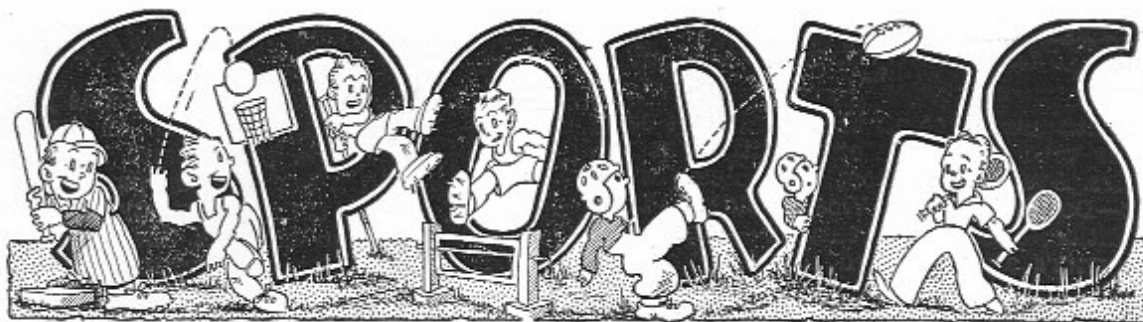
Keith Pixley, Lawrence Prentice, Glenn Powell and Leon Hubbard. This same team has come through the seventh grade undefeated. They really are champion material.

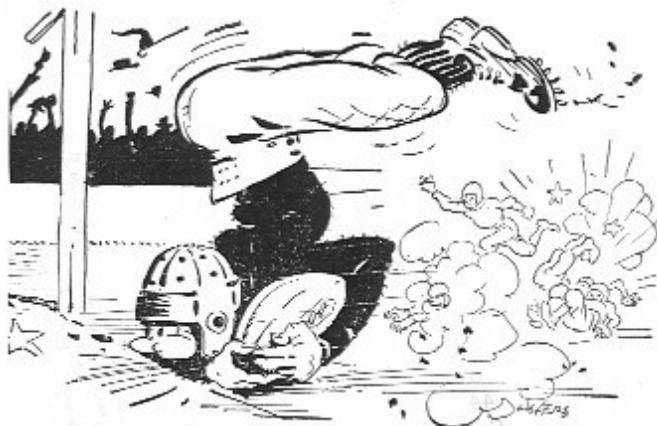
Walled Lake vs. Northville

BASKETBALL REVIEW

The Vikings opened the season with a resounding 45-24 victory over Clarenceville, with the half-time score reading 28-15. L. Gottschall tossed in sixteen points, to lead both teams.

Walled Lake chalked up their second win by overcoming a weak Auburn Heights squad 40-20. Keith Dunsmore led both teams with 12 points.

Meeting the Milford Trojans on their home floor proved disastrous for the lakesiders, as they lost their third game of the, 45-33. Walled Lake led at half-time but a spurt in the 3rd quarter paid Milford the victory.

Returning to their home court, the Viking 5 won a thriller from a rangy Farmington outfit on a last second field goal by Gottschall, which gave the home five a 28-27 win. Sharp led both teams with 10 points.

Elwood's free throw in the last 4 seconds provided the margin in Walled Lake's 31-34 victory over a rough, fast Keego five. Elwood and Groff each made 9 points to lead the scoring.

Walled Lake narrowly missed winning their third straight game by virtue of a 35-34 loss to the Mustangs of Northville in a hotly disputed game. Elwood chalked up 12 points to lead the losers.

A tall Clawson team defeated the Vikings decisively in their next game, controlling the game all the way to a 35-30, when the Lakesiders started a late rally that was cut short by the time. Elwood again led the locals with 12 points.

A fast-breaking Walled Lake team surprised Milford to the tune of 38-35 victory. In a wide-open high scoring game, the Vikings won their 3rd league game by outrunning a fast Milford quintet. Elwood led the scoring with 14 points.

The Vikings lost a lowscoring contest to a rough Madison team at Madison 29-26. Elwood and Ayles led, with 7 points.

On a bitterly disputed game at Farmington, the Vikings lost a last record decision to Farmington, 24-22. A last second basket by Jerry Parrish, which would have tied the score, was cancelled on a foul. The fans are still talking about this one.

Despite the disheartening defeat at Farmington, Walled Lake bounced back to beat a very rough Madison team 29-25, with Jerry Long scoring 12 points. However, in a visit to Keego Harbor, the home team was rather badly beaten by a rugged President five, 39-31. Sharpe led the losers with 9 points.

Walled Lake thus lost all possible chance for a share of the league title. In their remaining games, the Vikings trounced Holly 45-28, with Dunsmore scoring 9 points; and played one of

Probably the most outstanding team achievement thus far this year was the fifth place the Vikings obtained in the Seventh Annual DeVilbiss Night Relays in Toledo. Here the Walled Lake thinclads competed against 17 other schools from Michigan and Ohio. It was the notable performances of Ray Grables, Jerry Parrish, Chuck Kelly, and Bill Smith which enabled the Vikings to nose out Genoa of Ohio. It is believed that this is the first time in the history of the school that a Walled Lake team has competed out-of-state in an inter-scholastic athletic event.

Sophomore Jerry Parrish, the only returning letterman is captain of the team and specializes in the dashes and high jump.
